Gaza recorded tens of thousands of deaths, witnessed destruction & devastation--a huge humanitarian crisis that unfolded in our era and in front of our eyes.


On social media, there was a clear feeling that though the conflict had prolonged so much and it was already too late, but at least, peace may now return to the troubled region.

Delhi's air quality worsens, pollution rises despite the drop in stubble burning

Winter air quality analysis shows that the particulate matter 2.5 levels show a 3.4% increase

As the new year begins, the assessment of annual trends in the level of particulate matter 2.5, which is termed as PM2.5, has gone up. This is certainly a cause of worry. The annual PM2.5 concentration has increased to 104.7 microgram per cubic metre [µg/m³] in 2024--a 3.4 per cent rise from 2023 levels, as per the CSE assessment.

This is also more than twice the national ambient air quality standard of 40 µg per m³. The PM2.5 levels have increased after consistent decline and stabilisation between 2018 and 2022. "This is not an annual aberration due to meteorological factors. Consistent rise indicates the impact of growing pollution. Delhi seems to be losing its air quality gains from past action",



Anumita Roychowdhury says. The assessment shows "persistent and consistent rise for a second consecutive year since 2022". Centre for Science and Environment (CSE) has released an assessment of annual trends in levels of particulate matter 2.5 (PM2.5) in the air of Delhi in 2024 – and the findings are dark. "This can't be seen as an annual aberration due to meteorological factors....

...consistent rise indicates the impact of growing pollution in the region. Delhi seems to be losing its air quality gains from past action. Local and regional sources of pollution including vehicles, industries, open burning of waste, use of solid fuels, construction and dust sources have offset the gains".

"The King must step in. We can't have Keir heading the country," he added in the thread.

Given the recent salvos by Musk, many social media users questioned the philosophy dominating Musk's social media platform, as it seems to reward those who spread seeds of hate or force one-sided views. It was not the intention of creators of this platform.

UK politicians are not alone in being the target of Musk's increasingly eccentric interventions. He has also called Justin Trudeau of Canada, "an insufferable tool" and attacked Ukrain's Zelensky after a Trump-Putin spat. Apart from commenting on the US govt's Visa policy and other issues, his tweets appear to be targeting entire groups. During the last two years of Musk's ownership of X, people noticesd that it has become a sort of a platform, on which users with rightwing or extreme right-wing leanings are getting more liberty to criticize their opponents, in the name of freedom of expression.
